"born in Troy in the County of Bristol and State of Massachusetts in the year one thousand seven hundred and fifty-eight, twenty-ninth day of January."

DAVID WEAVER m. PHILADELPHIA COWEN, d OF ABISHAI & HOPE (CHASE) COWEN IN 1833 IN DARTMOUTH.

DAVID & "PHILA" HAD ONE SON, JOSEPH A. WEAVER, 1840-1869, WHO AT AGE 23 REGISTERED FOR THE US CIVIL WAR. DIED AT AGE 29, 9 MONTHS & 16 DAYS.

DAVID, PHILADELPHIA AND JOSEPH A. ARE ALL INTERRED IN THE WEAVER FAMILY BURIAL GROUND






UMASS CAMPUS IN DARTMOUTH



WHAT IS THE HISTORY OF THE PROPERTY?

AGE OF THE HOUSE

- DEED TELLS US THAT LEMUEL BARKER & WIFE MERIAH (TRIPP) BARKER OWNED IT PRIOR TO 1805 AND CONVEYED IT TO JOSEPH WEAVER IN JANUARY OF 1805.
- Not clear when the house was built but a clue might be the fact that
- Lemuel Barker m. Meriah Tripp in 1793
- JOSEPH WEAVER WAS LIVING IN IT IN 1798

• Conclusion: BUILT: "1793-1798"

Howall men by these hesents that & Lemuel Barker of Darlmouth in the County of Whistob & Commonwealth of Massachusells Geoman in consideration of one Thousand Dollars spaid by Joseph Weaver of the town County Hommonwealth aspects aid Same, the receist whereof of do hereby acknowledge do hereby give grant sell and convey unto the said forefit Weaver Hohis heirs and assigns forever asam or tract of land with a dwelling house thereon situate in Dailmouth as fresaid containing by estimation about fifty across be the same more or less with all the privileger and up furtenances thereunts belonging and bounded as follows: beginning

LEMUEL BARKER FOR \$1,000 TO JOSEPH WEAVER, ABOUT FIFTY ACRES
WITH A DWELLING HOUSE ON 8 JANUARY 1805 ETC ETC





WAS "T. WEAVER" HOUSE IN 1856


1856 WALLING MAP- GEORGE ALMY HOUSE



HIS SERVICE

HIS REVOLUTIONARY WAR SERVICE

ENLISTED ON JUNE 3, 1776 AT AGE 18

DRAFTED NUMEROUS TIMES AFTER THAT UNTIL SEPTEMBER 1778 (See Joseph Weaver's deposition for details).

HIS REVOLUTIONARY WAR SERVICE

...June of 1776, sent to Howland's Ferry, joined the Army in the Company under the command of Captain Daniel Devol ...

...Spring of 1777, sent to Fogland Ferry...

...June 1778, ... to guard the shore from New Bedford river so-called, to Slocum's River in Dartmouth...under the command of Captain George Hoskins...

THE RAID ON NEW BEDFORD

"The said Joseph says that while he was on duty as aforesaid he Quartered at the time at a place called Mishaum near the shore aforesaid, that during the time aforesaid and while he was performing ???? the British burnt the village of Bedford, that as soon as we heard of the landing and march of the British as aforesaid, we was marched to the Village of Bedford, when we arrived there it was in the evening, the British had left the place, the Village and Shipping were on fire, we found three men had been shot and was then laying on the streets."

IN THE THICK OF IT!!


"The said Joseph says he assisted in taking care of those men that were shot, one of them by the name of Trafford was dead, one by the name of Russell died in a few minutes after he got to him and while he was conveying him to the house, the other by the name of Thomas Cook was mortally wounded and died about a week after from his wounds.--The said Joseph says that he was employed for some time in saving property from fire in the Village of Bedford."

RESEARCHER'S NOTES

"In September 1778, as part of British operations in the American Revolutionary War, Major General Charles Grey raided the Massachusetts communities of New Bedford, Fairhaven, and Martha's Vineyard. The raid was one of the first in a series between 1778 and 1781 executed by the British against American coastal communities. Originally intended as a relief force for the British garrison that was briefly besieged at Newport, Rhode Island, Grey's force of 4,000 arrived after the Americans had already retreated. Thus Grey's force was diverted, for raiding, by British army officer General Sir Henry Clinton. On September 5 and 6, Grey raided New Bedford and Fairhaven, encountering significant resistance only in Fairhaven. His troops destroyed storehouses, shipping, and supplies in New Bedford, where they met with light resistance from the local militia, and damaged fewer American holds at Fairhaven, where militia resistance had additional time to organize.








SARAH (BRYANT) WEAVER 1763-1853



WEAVER CEMETERY NOTES FROM JIM COSTA FEB 2017

Cemetery is about 200' SSE from farm house.

Dimensions are 33' x 33' square. confirmed by town assessors at 1089 sq'

No cut stones in wall but drill holes for buggy hitch, gate and latch. Lead sheathing, pinned with square nails similar to Tremont Nail in Wareham.

Remains of gate painted red with 1900 style hinge and gypsum screws indicate repairs after 1906? Probably by Szala family.

11 grave stones and markers facing east / west orientation for judgment day. Initialed markers temporarily used as foot stones till head stone in place?
