




That on the afternoon of Saturday May 19" 1888, the Chairman and Secretary vicited the Jown of Dartmouth and spent several hours examining the records which they found were kept in a large iron Rafe, and those of particular interest to New Gedford were, many of them in a very dilapidated Condition those of 1776 to 1979 inclusive appeared to be last. and the committee found documents evidently in the hundwriting of the late fames B. 4. ANIMALS, WILD AND DOMESTICATED MORE IMPORTANT THEN

NAMES OF ANIMALS IN THE COLLECTION OF DTMR1674-1787 **DOMESTIC**: GEESE, HOGS/SWINE, SHEEP, RAMS, HORSES, STEERS, HEIFERS, OXEN, GOATS, COWS

WILD: WILD CATS, BEARS, WOLVES, SQUIRRELS, BLACKBIRDS, CROWS, FISH, DEER

Examples:

- 1684, 24 September-"the Town have ordered that the Indians shall have liberty to hunt provided that they doo kill thre *woolves* or three *bears*: or pay ten shilling yearly to itch village the Indians that belong to Quishnet are to pay ten shillings to John Spooner and the Indians belonging to Ponaganset are to pay teen shillings to Return Badcock and the Indians to Cokset are to pay teen shillings to Jeames Sisson the aforsaid money is to be received for the Town's use and delivered to the Town at their demand" (DTMR:004)
- 1685, 29 May "that whereas it doth appear that Indian Robben living at Saconet did kill a wolf some time this last year within the township of Dartmouth that he shall have six shillings paid unto him out of the Town's rate by the Constable at some convenient time after the making of this years rate and that any Indian or Indians that shall kill any wolves or bears hereafter within this Township and bring the heads of said wolf or bear to the Constable shall have six shillings paid unto him or them for each wolf or bear so killed. Also ordered that the English shall have ten shillings for the killing of a wolf or bear within this Township to be paid out of the town rate by the Constable." (DTMR:006)
- 1686, 26 July "It is ordered that <u>horse kind</u> of 2 year old and upwards shall be valued at fifty shillings a piece <u>oxen</u> at seven pounds a yoke <u>steers</u> of four year old and upwards to be counted <u>oxen</u> and <u>steers</u> and <u>heifers</u> of two year old and three year old to be counted as <u>cows</u> and <u>cows</u> to be valued at forty shillings a piece and <u>yearling</u> both <u>mete</u>(sic) and <u>horsekind</u> to be valued at twenty shillings a piece and <u>sheep</u> and <u>goats</u> of a year old and upwards at five shillings a piece and <u>swine</u> of a year old and upwards at eight shillings a piece." (DTMR:008)

1704/05, 29 January - {Early tax abatement and tax transfer program}" At a Town Meting(sic) in Dartmouth the: 29 day of February:1704/05:".... it is also ordered at said meeting that every householder being a planter shall kill 12 blackbirds between the first day of January and the middle of May yearly on pain of forfeiting three half pence for every bird they shall neglect of killing of sd number sd forfeitures to be added to each defective person's Town rate yearly to be paid to the Town stock and further it is ordered that for every <u>blackbird</u> that shall be killed within the Town within the time limited over the number of 12 to each planter as above shall be paid 1 penny out of the Town stock or be abated out of their rate in the next Town Rate. It is also ordered that each *crow* that shall be killed within the sd time yearly shall be reckoned for three **blackbirds**. It is also ordered that Joseph Tripp Matthew Wing Nathan Howland John Russell and Isaac Spooner be the persons to take account of what *birds* are killed in the Town and give an account yearly to the Selectmen so that the penalty may be laid on those that are such as are negligent and money may be raised to pay to them that kill more than their number. It is also ordered that there shall be a law book bought for the Town's use and be paid for out of the Town rate above sd. "(DTMR:021)

5. BALANCE THE RESPONSIBILITIES BETWEEN THE "VILLAGES"

It is apparent that a semblance of balance was aimed for in the choice of people to fill various town offices with attention being paid to the three <u>sections</u> called "villages" Cushena, Ponaganset, and Coxcet. Note in the following examples.

- 27May 1679 "Richard Sison (sic), Henry Tucker and Thomas Pope are chosen Surveyors . . ." (DTMR:002) Note that Sisson was from Coxcet, Tucker from Ponaganset, and Pope from Cushena.
- 30 May 1681 "...that it shall be accounted as sufficient warning for Town Meetings for the constable to sett up their notice one att the house of William Spooner and one att the house of Richard Sison(sic) and **one at the mill** in each of which notice shall be represented the occasion of the meeting." (DTMR:003) *Spooner was from Cushena, Sisson, Coxet, and "at the mill" referred to Smith Mills in Ponaganset*
- 1 June 1683 "Also Richard Sisson John Smith and Thomas Taber are chosen to survey the road that lies through the town that so it may be brought to record and they are to have each of them two shillings and six pence a day to be paid out of the rate." (DTMR:004) Sisson, Coxcet, Smith, Ponaganset, Taber, Cushena.
- 12 November 1684 "The town have ordered that the Indians shall have liberty to hunt provided that they do kill three wolves or three bears: or pay ten shillings yearly to each village the Indians that do belong to Quishnet are to pay ten shillings to John Spooner and the Indians belonging to Ponaganset are to pay ten shillings to Return Badcock and the Indians of Cokset are to pay ten shillings to Jeames Sisson the aforesaid money is to be received for the Town 's use and delivered to the Town at their demand." (DTMR:005) Again, notice that attention is paid to each of the three"villages": Spooner, Cushena (Quishnet), Return Badcock was from Smith Mills in Ponaganset "village" and Sisson was from the Head of Westport in Coxcet.
- 1685, 29 May "it is agreed that . . . the Village of Coxset shall extend so far as Peleg Slocums and ponaganset village from thence to Hezakiah Smiths and that Coxset Village shall repair the roadways from the Westerrmost side of this township to the east side of the Nocachak river and Ponaganset from thence unto the east side of the next swamp to the east of the rock swamp which is about midway between the mill and Cushnet and Cushnet village to repair from thence to the east side of this township" (DTMR:006)
