FROM THE MINUTES OF THE

Yearly Meeting of Friends for **New-England**, Held on **Rhode-Island**,

From the 15th to the 23d, inclusive, of the Sixth month, 1845.

The Annual Report of the Committee of this Meeting having the government and superintendence of the Boarding School at **Providence**, was produced and read, and being satisfactory to us, the Clerk was directed to forward copies thereof to our several Quarterly and Monthly Meetings. Extract from the Minutes of said Meeting, **A. SHEARMAN, Jun.** Clerk.

TO THE YEARLY MEETING.

The Boarding School Committee report, That they have endeavored during the past year, to discharge the duties entrusted to them by the Yearly Meeting, in superintending the concerns of the Boarding School. The average number of scholars has been eighty. Meetings have been regularly held in the house, except during the vacations; and harmony has prevailed.

Our friends **Allen** and **Olive Wing**, who have acceptably served the Institution as Super-intendents for several years past, having requested to be released at the close of the last summer term, we engaged our friends **Olney** and **Lydia Thompson** to take their places, and they entered upon the duties of that station in the 10th month last. **Charles Atherton**, **William Nicholson** and **Edward Hoag** are engaged as Teachers in the Boys' School, and **Mary Atherton**, **Gertrude E. Whittier**, and **Elizabeth Prosser**, in the Girls'. **Elizabeth J. Aldrich** has been employed as Teacher in the Girls' school the past year.

The Treasurer's and Superintendent's accounts have been examined and settled, by which it appears that the income of the School from all sources, the past year, has been \$9,380 40-100, and its expenditures \$11,134 47-100, including \$1,542 59-100, paid for land purchased from a donation, and in accordance with the will of our late friend **Moses Brown**. And there is now a balance in the Treasury of \$4,469 4-100.

We would propose that the price of board and tuition be continued the same as last year, viz: \$30 per term for members of our Yearly Meeting, \$45 for those who are not members, one or both of whose parents are members, and \$50 for those of other Yearly Meetings. — Books and Stationery being furnished as at present. We also deem it safe to propose, that each Monthly Meeting have the privilege of sending one scholar free of expense, for one term; and that they may occupy this privilege either during the next winter term, or during the summer term of *next year*, according to the discretion of the Monthly Meeting; but that if the Monthly Meeting desires to occupy the privilege in the summer term, as now proposed, it shall inform the Acting Committee thereof at their meeting in the 10th month, [held on the 7th day thereof.]

The Schools have been examined at the close of each term by a committee appointed for that purpose, and by their reports it appears that they have been generally satisfied with the evidence afforded by the diligence and application of the children to their studies, of their orderly deportment, and of the faithfulness and ability of the Teachers. Instruction continues to be given in the Languages when desired, on the same terms as heretofore, viz: \$5 additional for the term.

The object that Friends had in view in the establishment of this Institution, and the lively concern the Society has felt and continues to feel, that the youth among us may have the advantages of a good school, without exposure to those associations which in a greater or

less degree tend to alienate their tender minds from the simplicity of our profession, may, we trust, in good degree be realized by placing our children in this Institution. And we would affectionately encourage Friends to be willing to make some sacrifice, if sacrifice be required, to afford those under their care an opportunity to acquire a sound and guarded education.

At our Yearly Meeting of Friends for **New England**, held on **Rhode Island** in the sixth month, 1846—

The Committee having the superintendence of the Boarding School at **Providence** presented their annual report, which was read; and while the care thus manifested by the Committee is satisfactory to this Meeting, yet, in view of the importance of the concern, and with desires that the greatest amount of good may be dispensed to the members of our religious Society from an Institution established, as we doubt not, in best wisdom, and endowed and cherished by beloved friends, deeply concerned for the promotion of truth and the preservation and guarded education of the children of this Society, we are induced now to appoint our friends * * * * * * a Committee to take the whole subject into their solid consideration, and if, after careful deliberation, they are prepared to propose any change, either in the Committee or in the manner of their discharging the duties of their appointment, or to make any other suggestion that they apprehend will promote the interests of the Institution, they are requested to report the same to a future sitting of this Meeting.

At a subsequent sitting, the Committee to whom this subject was referred presented the following report, viz. :—

"TO THE YEARLY MEETING.

"The Committee to whom was referred the consideration of the report of the School Committee, and who were requested to make any suggestions that they might deem important in relation to the welfare of the School and promotion of the best interests of the Institution, report:

"That they have given to the subject their careful deliberation, and are united in making the following propositions to the Yearly Meeting, viz.:

"In order to effect a more direct responsibility on the part of those appointed by the Yearly Meeting to superintend the School, and to induce greater efficiency of action in the direction and management of its affairs, we would propose that a small Committee of twelve of each sex should be appointed by the Yearly Meeting, to whom should be committed the care and superintendence of the Institution, six of whom (three of each sex) should be released from the charge and six others substituted annually. These six should be eligible to reappointment after one year, and the others to continue to be released in rotation, from year to year.

"It should be understood that this Committee should give their personal attention closely to the School, and should meet there monthly and appoint of their number such as they should deem proper to have the more immediate charge thereof during the recess of their meetings. They should visit the Schools to know for themselves their true state, by attending them during school hours, and by witnessing, advising, and directing in relation to the process of instruction, and they should judge of the standing and progress of the children, and enter into free intercourse with them and their teachers. They should advise with and direct the Superintendents respecting the expenditures and domestic management of the family, and endeavor to feel and exercise an individual interest in the various concerns of the Institution.

"We would also propose that the Yearly Meeting should appoint a General Committee on the subject of education, to be composed of Friends from the several Quarterly Meetings, to promote the guarded education of our children, both in the Boarding School and in Monthly Meeting, Preparative Meeting and family schools, in accordance with the concern long felt by the Yearly Meeting. This Committee on Education should meet and consult with the School Committee at the time of our Yearly Meeting at **Newport**, and also at the School at the time of the examination in the tenth month at the close of the summer term. Both Committees should freely communicate with each other, and thereby endeavor to promote the guarded, religious education of the youth of our Society. The whole to be subject to the control and direction of the Yearly Meeting annually.

The report of the Boarding School Committee for the past year being approved was directed to be recorded and transmitted by the Clerk to our Quarterly and Monthly Meetings.

"TO THE YEARLY MEETING.

"The Boarding School Committee report, that they have endeavored the past year to discharge the duties entrusted to them by the Yearly Meeting in superintending the concerns of the Institution.

"Religious meetings have been regularly held in the house except during the vacations. The average number of scholars the past year has been eighty-four. The schools have been examined at the close of each term by a committee appointed for the purpose, from whose reports it appears that the evidence afforded of diligence and proficiency on the part of the pupils, and ability and faithfulness on that of the teachers, were satisfactory and encouraging. Instruction continues to be given in the languages when desired on the same conditions as heretofore, to wit, five dollars a term additional charge.

"The Treasurer's and Superintendents' accounts have been examined and settled, by which it appears that the income of the School for the last year has been \$9,534 93, and the expenditures \$11,131 39; leaving a balance in the treasury of \$2,886 74.

"We would propose that the terms for board and tuition be the same as last year, to wit, thirty dollars a term for members of this Yearly Meeting, forty-five dollars for those who are not members, one or both of whose parents are members, and fifty dollars for members of other Yearly Meetings, books and stationary being furnished as at present. We would also propose that each Monthly Meeting have the privilege of sending one scholar a term free of expense, as last year, and that they occupy this privilege either in the winter term or in the summer term next succeeding; and the Monthly Meetings are desired, should they deem it best not to send a scholar till the summer term, to inform the Acting Committee at its meeting in the tenth month.

"Our friends Olney and Lydia Thompson are engaged as Superintendents, and Charles Atherton, Samuel Austin, and Edward Hoag as teachers in the boys school, and Mary Atherton and Gertrude Whittier in the girls'. David C. Chace was employed during the winter term as an assistant in the boys' department, and Elizabeth Prosser during the year in the girls'. William Nicholson was also employed as a teacher in the boys' school during the summer term of the past year.

"Since our last report, the Committee have made several valuable additions to the philosophical apparatus belonging to the Institution.

"Although the number of scholars has been somewhat larger during the past than the prece-

ding year, yet the Committee regret that no more of the children of Friends enjoy the advantages which the Institution affords for a thorough school education, free in good measure from the corrupting influences of the world. The improved condition of schools, both public and private, within the limits of **New England**, may seem to have diminished the necessity of placing our children in the Boarding School; but we believe that most of these schools will be found to exercise an influence adverse to the simplicity and purity of our Christian profession, and many of them to expose the susceptible minds of our youth to those corrupting associations from which it has ever been the concern of Friends carefully to guard them. The religious concern for the guarded education of our children, which the principal donors to the school fund uniformly manifested, we hope will be steadily borne in mind by all those upon whom devolve the parental care and guardianship of the young; that the substantial advantages so liberally placed within their reach may be reaped to greater extent in time to come.

ADDRESS TO FRIENDS IN **NORTH AMERICA**,
FROM

THE COMMITTEE OF THE SOCIETY OF FRIENDS IN **LONDON**, APPOINTED ON THE SUBJECT OF THE DISTRESS EXISTING IN **IRELAND**.

Dear Friends.

That brotherly love and sympathy which have so long prevailed between us and our friends in **America** induce us to communicate with you on a subject which is at present exciting a very deep and lively interest in the minds of Friends in this country.

You are, doubtless, already well aware of the existence of the awful calamity which has overspread a large part of **Ireland**. The almost total failure of the potato crop, on which so great a proportion of the inhabitants of that country depended for a supply of food, has occasioned destitution and famine to an alarming extent. This afflictive dispensation of Divine Providence early awakened the sympathies of Friends in **Ireland** and in **England**; and Meetings of Friends were in consequence convened, both in **Dublin** and in **London**, to consider the subject. The Meetings thus held entered with hearty concurrence upon the subject; and notwithstanding the large and comprehensive measures of the Government for providing employment for able-bodied labourers, and the partial efforts

made in some quarters to raise collections for the distressed, it was felt that there was a part which Friends had to perform, and to which they were called to apply themselves with earnestness and zeal; Committees were accordingly appointed by the said Meetings respectively; and these Committees are now in active operation, cordially and harmoniously labouring together.

The administrative part of the work of course rests, in great measure, with our friends in **Ireland**; and we have the satisfaction to inform you that they have made wise and efficient arrangements for the fulfilment of their trust, and are acting in it with great zeal and assiduity. The appeal which has been made to Friends generally, in both countries, has been responded to *with marked liberality*; but we feel that the utmost that can be thus raised will be little indeed in comparison with the magnitude of the calamity to be relieved,—a calamity affecting millions of our fellow-subjects, and of the probable

termination of which we cannot at present form any idea.

Our friends in **Dublin** have established a correspondence with their brethren in various parts of **Ireland**, with the view of collecting information and assisting in the distribution of relief; and our dear friend **Wm. Forster**, under a feeling of duty, offered himself to undertake a visit of inspection through the most destitute districts. This offer was cordially encouraged by his friends both in **London** and **Dublin**; and he has been for several weeks, and still is, laboriously employed in the prosecution of his arduous engagement. A Friend of **Ireland** is associated with him therein; and they have been agreeably and usefully attended by one or more young men from this country. The reports received from these friends (of the first portion of which we send you a printed copy, together with our Address to Friends) furnish ample evidence that the accounts of the existing destitution had

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been by no means over-stated, and prove, that whilst a very commendable anxiety to succour the starving population around them, is more or less prevalent amongst the comparatively few who are of ability to do so in the respective districts, there is a crying necessity for all the additional aid that can be afforded: they also show that suitable channels are open for the distribution of the money which may be raised.

Our friends in **Dublin** have been diligently occupied in devising and perfecting plans for prudently supplying relief in the districts thus visited; and also in investigating and meeting the claims which are beginning to pour in upon them from other quarters.

We have now briefly, and we are aware but imperfectly, given you to understand what is thus awakening our sympathy and our sorrow. We hear that you have, during the past year, been blessed with very fruitful harvests in many parts of your continent; and we wish, in thus communicating with you, not only to enlist your sympathies, but to open the way for your co-operation, and to invite you, in the exercise of that enlarged commiseration which you will doubtless feel, to aid us in this work, by the supply of either food or money, as you may think fit.

The Committee to superintend our Boarding School at **Providence**, presented the following report, which was approved by this Meeting and directed to be forwarded to our Quarterly and Monthly Meetings, viz:

TO THE YEARLY MEETING:

The committee appointed to have the superintendence of the Boarding School at **Providence**, report, that they have during the past year given attention to their appointment, and are encouraged to believe, that the Institution continues to be useful.

The average number of scholars has been eighty-five, viz: forty-two males and forty-three females.

Our friends Olney and Lydia Thompson, have acceptably served as Superintendents during the year ending with the last winter term; and Charles Atherton, Samuel Austin and Edward G. Hoag, have been engaged as teachers in the boys' school, and Mary Atherton and Gertrude E. Whittier as teachers in that of the girls for the same time. Elizabeth Prosser has also been an assistant teacher in the girls' school during the winter term.

The Superintendents having expressed their desire to be

released at the end of the last winter term, and the Committee believing that usefulness would arise from an arrangement which would unite with the general care and oversight of the Institution as Superintendents, that of taking the general government and direction of the schools, and imparting literary instruction therein, to such extent as may be consistent with the other duties of Superintendents, we have engaged our friends Silas Cornell and Sarah M. Cornell of Rochester, New York, to come into the Institution in that capacity, and assume those duties.

Charles Atherton, Edward G. Hoag, and Richard Dame, are engaged as assistant teachers in the boys' school, (the latter giving instruction in the languages,) and Gertrude E. Whittier and Sarah Alice Cornell, as assistant teachers in the girls' school, for a part or the whole of the present year.

As our friends **Silas** and **Sarah M. Cornell** could not consistently with their previous engagements, commence their connection with the Institution until the present time, the former Superintendents kindly consented to remain, temporarily, after their previous engagement expired -- and the former arrangements in the schools have mostly been continued since the commencement of the present term.

The change of Superintendents and the arrangements with respect to the principal charge of the school is now about to take place; and the friends who have for several years occupied the station of Superintendents being about to leave, seems a fitting occasion to express for their encouragement, the satisfaction of the Committee with their labors.

These labors were increased during the latter part of the last year, by more than usual indisposition among the scholars.

Meetings for worship have been regularly held in the House, except during the vacations, and harmony has prevailed. On the days of **Providence** Preparative Meeting, the meetings at the school have been omitted, in accordance with the consent of the Yearly Meeting last year.

Examination of the schools by the Committee, at the close of each term, have been made, as has been heretofore practised, and the deportment and proficiency of the scholars have been generally satisfactory, evincing a good degree of aptitude and diligence on the part of the pupils, and faithfulness on the part of the teachers.

The accounts of the Treasurer and Superintendent have been examined and settled. By these accounts it appears, that the income of the school for the year ending with the last winter term, has been \$10,836 07, and the expenditures \$12,136 54; the expenditures having exceeded the receipts by the sum of \$1300 47. Seven hundred dollars of this excess, arises from the payment within the year of a demand against the Institution of several years standing.

The amount of expenditures exceeding the income, has been supplied from the balance on hand at the commencement of the year; and being deducted therefrom, leaves a balance on hand at the close of the last term, of \$1858 05.

We would propose that the price of board and tuition be continued the same as last year, viz: Thirty dollars per term for members of our Yearly Meeting, forty-five dollars for those who are not members, one or both of whose parents are members, and fifty dollars for those of other Yearly Meetings, payable in advance -- books and stationery being furnished as at present.

We would also propose, that each Monthly Meeting have the privilege of sending one scholar free of expense for one term, the same to be occupied, either at the next winter or succeeding summer term, at the discretion of the Monthly Meeting—the several Monthly Meetings to notify the Committee at their meeting in the 10th month, of their conclusion, in case they propose to occupy the privilege in the summer term.

The Committee feel it right to express their belief, that there are advantages to be derived to the youth of our society at the school, which should serve as an encouragement to Friends to place their children there, that they may acquire a guarded religious education, free from many of the temptations to which they are necessarily exposed in more mixed schools, especially those over which Friends have little or no control.

And we would earnestly press upon Friends the importance to the society of a continued individual interest in the welfare of the Institution, in whose endowment and management such lively concern has been manifested by valuable Friends who are now gathered to their rest.

Providence, 6th month 1st, 1847.

Third day morning, the 15th. Friends convened pursuant to adjournment. The representatives being called, were all present.

The Meeting entered upon the investigation of the state of society by reading the Queries and Answers to them received at this time from our several Quarterly Meetings, and proceeded therein as far as the 4th inclusive. During this important engagement we were sensibly solemnized in feeling together, and under the baptizing influence of Divine love, much pertinent counsel and advice were given by concerned brethren. We were impressively reminded of the paramount duty of meeting together for the worship of our Father in heaven, not only on first day of the week, but on other days when a greater sacrifice may seem to be required. We were admonished to remember the source from whence proceed all our blessings; that it is from God alone that we derive all that we are per-

mitted to enjoy, whether spiritual or temporal; that it is in Him we live, and move, and have our being. We were exhorted to hold fast the profession of our faith without wavering, being concerned to provoke one another to love and good works, and not neglect the assembling of ourselves together. Much sympathy was manifested for Friends in lonely situations, where their meetings are very small; but they were earnestly exhorted to faithfulness in the attendance of them—that although they may be frequently held in silence, yet, as we are engaged to wait upon the Lord, they often prove seasons of refreshment. Concerned Friends were encouraged to labor faithfully with those who may be remiss in the discharge of this and other Christian duties, although it may be under a sense of much weakness; that, while they may feel their own unworthiness, they fail not to do what is required at their hands by the Head of the Church, by sinking below the gifts he has conferred upon them. Friends were encouraged to leave their worldly occupations, to close their places of business if needful, in order for the due attendance of our weekday meetings, under an awful sense that He, unto whom worship is due, may even curse our blessings. We were very impressively exhorted to watch the door of our lips, that we sin not with our tongues; that, under a sense of our own frailties, we cultivate charity towards others, and scrupulously avoid indulging in a spirit of detraction, which tends to our own poverty and the injury of our fellow men. We were reminded that, as God is love, and as his love has been so abundantly manifested to us, in that He gave his well beloved Son for us, that it is indeed incumbent upon us to love one another,

and to do good one unto another; and that they who have known this love shed abroad in their hearts, cannot fail to feel it flow unto others, producing a spirit of forgiveness towards those who have trespassed against us, even as God for Christ's sake hath forgiven us. The injunction of our Lord, of universal application, "Whatsoever ye would that men should do to you, do ye even so to them," was very feelingly held up to view as the rule that should at all times govern us in our intercou[r]se with our fellow men. The right training of our children was pertinently dwelt upon, and its necessity enforced as essential to their good, and to the discharge of the responsibility resting upon parents towards those whom our Heavenly Father has entrusted to our care. We were reminded that, by indulging in a mistaken tenderness, we were inflicting a serious injury upon our offspring; but that as we were engaged to exercise parental authority in love, it would prove a discipline to our children, by which they might be incited more carefully to heed the requirements of their Heavenly Parent; and habits of obedience be established which would be preserving in their future course of life. Finally, both parents and children were affectionately entreated to observe their respective relative duties, that thus they might witness the dew of Heaven to rest upon them.

Adjourned to the fourth hour this afternoon.

Afternoon. Friends again assembled.

The Meeting proceeded in the consideration of the state of Society, by reading the remaining answers to the queries. While thus engaged, we thankfully acknowledge that a precious, solemn covering was felt to be mercifully extended over us. A living concern was manifested for the preservation of our members from the reading of pernicious books, which are at this day so abundant in the world; and for their encouragement in the frequent, reverent perusal of the Holy Scriptures, in accordance with the continued concern of this Society since its first rise, and which was so eminently exhibited, practically, by our forefathers in the truth. We were affectionately reminded that they who are most carefully engaged to follow the direct and immediate leadings of the Spirit of Truth, most highly reverence and value these sacred writings, which were given forth by the same Spirit, and which have been so marvellously preserved, pure and unmutilated, to the present day, and which are able to make wise unto salvation through faith which is in Christ Jesus. Parents were affectionately encouraged often to assemble their families for the purpose of reading a portion of the Holy Scriptures, and in silent introversion of mind, and with prayerful hearts meditating thereon, that their precious contents may be opened to our understandings and blessed to us. We were entreated not to be taken in that snare of the enemy which is laid for us, by inducing us to neglect this practice from fear of being found in a lifeless formality in its maintenance; but that while we should guard, with godly jealousy, against this error on the one hand, we were impressively reminded that we might err on the other hand, and neglect the observance of those necessary practices which are essential to our Christian advancement, and which are in the ordering of Him who knows our necessities, and who has so abundantly provided for them.

A proposition contained in the report of **Fairfield** Quarterly Meeting, relative to the expenses incurred by the Yearly Meeting, being brought into consideration, the subject is referred to the representatives from the several Quarterly Meetings, who are requested to report to a future sitting.

At a subsequent sitting, the representatives made the following report, which was satisfactory to the Meeting, viz:

The representatives to whom was referred the proposition from **Fairfield** Quarterly Meeting in relation to the expenses of the Yearly Meeting, have conferred together thereon, and have come to the conclusion to propose to the Yearly Meeting the adoption of the following minute—the provisions of which

are the same as those of the minute made by the Meeting [for?] Sufferings in the year 1830—and with only a slight alteration in the language to rend its meaning more explicit, viz. Such Friends as are of ability, who attend the Yearly Meet ing, should bear their own expenses—but those who may consider themselves able to do so, who reside north of a [line?] from **Boston**, running west to the Connecticut River, be [at?] liberty to avail themselves of such provision as may be made by this Meeting; and that Friends of the island of **Nantucket** and the representatives from all the Quarterly Meetings, shall be included in the provision made for those north of the line above mentioned in the same circumstances.

Among the exercises which have been with us during our deliberations at this time, has been a concern for the cons ent and upright maintenance by all our members of our testi mony to the unchristian nature of all wars and fightings—testimony in accordance with the belief and practice of the primitive followers of Christ. We are liable at this time some peculiar temptations on this account. Our country [is?] involved in war with a neighboring nation, and armies [are?] contending in the field; and the testimony of the Scriptures that "every battle of the warrior is with confused noise and garments rolled in blood," is brought home to us by frequent intelligence from the scene of strife. We earnestly desire that all our dear friends may be mercifully preserved in a Christian frame of mind under these trying circumstances.

To the humble follower of Him whose kingdom is not of this world, but who, as a stranger and pilgrim here, is journeying towards another country, that is, a heavenly—how do the destruction and horrors of the field of battle, or the city made desolate by an encompassing foe, the tears of the widow and the cries of the orphan, fill his mind with sorrow! He can have no sentiment allied to rejoicing at scenes like these. His soul must be clothed with mourning and his spirit with lamentation, and his prayers will be, that that day may be hastened when the nations shall learn war no more.

Our dear friends are affectionately entreated to be careful how they expose themselves unnecessarily to temptations calculated to lead the mind from a right frame of thought on these subjects; or by mingling with those who take delight in such strife, become in any measure leavened into their spirit; that in all our intercourse with the world, we may manifest ourselves to be followers of Him whose advent was announced by the song of the heavenly host, of peace on earth and good will to men.

In contemplating the present war in which our country is engaged, its exceeding wickedness has been forcibly presented to us, not only in its direct consequences as a war, but in the principal object, which, as we believe, produced it, namely the perpetuation and extension of slavery. We have been concerned that our members may keep ever before them the miseries and sinfulness inseparable from the practice of holding our fellow-men in bondage, and its utter inconsistency with the command of Christ, "Whatsoever ye would that men should do to you, do ye even so to them"; and that we fail not, faithfully, in the fear of the Lord, to bear our testimony against it, not feeling excused therefrom in consequence of its practical enactment not coming immediately before our view in this part of our land.

The Committee having charge of our Boarding School, presented the following Report, which was interesting and satisfactory to this Meeting, and the Clerk was directed to forward

"To the Yearly Meeting of Friends for New England.

The Committee for the Superintendence of the Yearly Meeting Boarding School at **Providence**, have, during the past year, attended to the duties of their appointment.

The School has been continued through the year (with the usual vacations) under the charge of **Silas** and **Sarah M. Cornell**, as Superintendents and principal Teachers.

During the Summer Term, we had the services of **Charles Atherton** and **Edward G. Hoag** as assistant Teachers in the male department of the school, and **Lafayette Burr**, a young man connected with Brown University, has, through the year, given lessons in the Latin and Greek languages for five days in the week, to a class in this school. **Richard Dame** has also assisted in teaching the languages during part of the time. In the Girls' School, **Gertrude E. Whittier** and **Sarah Alice Cornell** served as Teachers.

During the Winter Term, in the Boys' School, the same teachers remained, and the school being large, **Lindley M. Moore** was engaged as assistant teacher in addition.

Martha M. Haines, Sarah Joy Brown and Sarah Alice Cornell, were assistant teachers in the Girls' School during the same Term.

In addition to the Monthly Meetings of the Committee, and intermediate visits by sub-committees regularly appointed at these meetings for that service, semi-annual examinations at the close of each term, have been attended by the Committee; that at the close of the Summer Term being also attended by a number of the Yearly Meeting's Committee on education.

Our several examinations in these various forms, have been in general satisfactory. The Friends in the immediate care of the Institution, as superintendents, teachers, or in the more subordinate stations, have evinced a careful regard for the good of the School, and a concern for the faithful performance of their duties to their interesting charge, which have been satisfactory to the Committee.

Of the scholars, both male and female, we may say, that generally their deportment has been orderly, and their attention to their studies and improvement therein commendable—and we are encouraged to believe that the school has continued to be useful, in promoting the literary advancement of the scholars—and favorable, under the Divine blessing, to the awakening and strengthening of good resolutions for a consistent course in after life.

The average number of scholars has been one hundred and one, viz.: fifty-five males, and forty-six females.

Meetings for worship have been regularly held at the times appointed—and the family has been preserved in much harmony.

The accounts of Superintendent and Treasurer of the School Fund, have been examined and audited. The expenditures of the School for the past year, ending with the last winter term, have been twelve thousand, eight hundred and seventeen dollars and forty-three cents. The income has been as follows: Interest from the School Fund, six thousand, two hundred and forty-six dollars, seventy-seven cents;—from Board and Tuition of scholars, (including \$130 87 for articles sold and \$157 20 due from scholars for the past terms,) five thousand, three hundred and thirty-eight dollars, and seventy-seven cents. Total income, eleven thousand, five hundred and eighty-five dollars, and fifty-four cents—leaving a deficiency of income to meet expenditures of twelve hundred and thirty-one dollars, eighty-nine cents.

The available balance in the hands of the Treasurer in the Fifth month last, the time of the examination, may be stated at eleven hundred and eleven dollars and forty-six cents.

Considerable amount of repairs and alterations has been made during the past year, particularly in the warming and cooking apparatus at the School House, and some improve-

ment about the grounds, the expense of which, exceeding sixteen hundred dollars, is included in the expenditures above reported.

We would propose, that the terms of Board and Tuition should be continued as last year, viz. Thirty dollars per Term for members of our Yearly Meeting; forty-five dollars for those not members, one or both of whose parents are members, and fifty dollars for any others who may be admitted -- and that each Monthly Meeting have the privilege of sending one scholar free of expense for one term, the same to be occupied either at the next Winter or succeeding Summer Term, at the discretion of the Monthly Meeting; the several Monthly Meetings to notify the Committee at their meeting in the Tenth month of their conclusion, in case they propose to occupy the privilege in the Summer Term.

Among the subjects which have claimed the attention and concern of the Committee, has been the promotion of a conformity to our religious profession, and the requisitions of our discipline by the scholars, in plainness of dress and address. On this subject, labor and advice have been from time to time imparted in the schools. But the Committee have a strong belief of the importance of the care of parents, and of Monthly Meetings, with the children at home on these subjects. Under

this belief, and in pursuance of what they believed their duty under their appointment, they issued, in the Third month last, a communication addressed to Friends in the several Monthly Meetings, in the subject of plainness of speech, behavior and apparel—a copy of which is herewith presented.

During the past year, the health of the inmates of the School has been generally good, although we have to note some sickness, particularly a prevalence of colds and sore throats in the Third month, with which eight or ten of the male scholars were more or less affected—and the removal by death of two young men, scholars in the school, during the year. The first was **Thomas W. White**, from **Elizabeth City**, **Pacotank** county, **North Carolina**, who died on the 20th of Eleventh month last, aged 21 years; and of whom it was reported, that his deportment during all the time of his being at the School was orderly and satisfactory, never having in word or deed given occasion for reproof or dissatisfaction.

The second instance of mortality was **Benjamin Winslow**, of Winthrop, Maine, son of Joseph Winslow. He had been affected to some extent with sore throat, which had prevailed in the School, but from which he had nearly recovered, when he was seized with disease of the bowels, of which he died on the 3d of Fourth month, after a few days illness, aged 21 years. We believe it may not be without usefulness to say in this report, that the deportment of this young man, during the time he spent in the School, was very exemplary—and after his disease assumed a character which left him little or no prospect of recovery, he was favored unto the end, with much christian composure, and several times remarked, that although he felt his unworthiness to be great, yet he trusted that by the mercy of his Heavenly Father, through our Lord and Saviour, he should find forgiveness of his sins and be accepted. Death, he said, had no terrors for him. He manifested much gratitude towards those who had the care of him in his illness, and frequently spoke of his parents, towards whom he also felt very grateful, saying he believed their watchfulness and care over him, had done much towards preparing his mind for the solemn change that awaited him.

Month, inclusive, 1848; TO THE QUARTERLY AND MONTHLY MEETINGS OF FRIENDS IN GREAT BRITAIN. IRELAND. AND ELSEWHERE.

DEAR FRIENDS.

In coming together for the transaction of the affairs of the Church, we have been brought low under a sense of our manifold shortcomings: but, through the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, we have been comforted together in Him; our strength has been renewed, our faith and hope have been confirmed, and our hearts have been warmed with love one towards another, and towards all our dear brethren everywhere.

The answers to the queries annually brought up to this Meeting are designed to lay before us the state of our religious Society, and especially to show how far our members are faithful in the support of our various Christion testimonies. On this occasion, as in former years, we have been engaged in a careful examination of the

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reports which they furnish on these important particulars. But whilst thus entering into the details, we have also been led to take a more general view of the subject. These testimonies concern the several branches of a religious life and conversation; and the queries which relate to them may be all included in one comprehensive inquiry, What is the state of the tree? If the tree be corrupt, the fruit must be evil; if the tree be good, the fruit will be good also. Have we, dear friends, known that change of heart whereby the tree becomes good, and without which it is impossible to bring forth the fruits of the Spirit? Have we through repentance toward God and faith toward our Lord Jesus Christ, experienced a death unto sin and a new birth unto righteousness? Are we united unto Christ, the true vine? Do we know the operation of the Holy Spirit in the soul even as the sap circulates through the branch; and are we willing to be subject to its quickening, renovating and restraining influence in our daily life? These are solemn inquiries, in which we are all deeply concerned. May they be brought home to the heart and conscience of every one of us by the power of the Spirit of Truth!

The primitive believers in Christ are described as "walking in the fear of the Lord, and in the comfort of the Holy Ghost." The fear of God, which thus marked the disciples at the beginning, was also an eminent char-

acteristic of the religious experience of our forefathers in the Truth: they were made to tremble before the Lord, under the sense of their own corruption in the fall, and of his holiness; and when brought, through the grace of Christ, to partake of the joy and peace of believing, this holy reverence and awe dwelt with increasing power upon their spirits, kept them in watchfulness and tenderness, and in a remarkable manner accompanied the out-

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pouring of the Spirit upon them for services in the Church. Abundant are the evidences in the Sacred Scriptures of the blessed effects of this fear of the Lord, in preserving against temptation, and in giving a practical sense that God is everywhere present, and knoweth even the thoughts and intents of the heart. It is not the fear in which there is bondage; it is a filial fear, in perfect harmony with that love in which the child of the Lord breathes the language of adoption,—Abba, Father! It grows with his growth; and the further his advancement in Christian experience, the more place will it have in his heart, the more powerful and constant will be its influence over his words, and his very thoughts. As he comes through faithfulness to the teachings of the Holy Spirit, to be quick of understanding in this fear, what carefulness does it work in him! not only restraining him from the abuse, but limiting him in the use of outward things: it leads to a vigilant discharge of his stewardship of time, of talents and of substance: the pursuits of business, of intellect, and of taste, will be subject to its holy restraints.

Under the influence of this fear, and with a comprehensive view of the requirements of the Divine law, we are brought to the Christian standard of truthfulness and simplicity in language, and of plainness and self-denial in clothing, furniture, and in deportment; and, as becometh men professing godliness, we are led out of a conformity to the varying fashions of the day, and restrained from the pursuits of music and dancing, from theatrical entertainments, and from vain sports and other frivolous and hurtful amusements of the world. Suffer then, we beseech you dear brethren, the word of exhortation. Be willing to be kept within the bonds of this holy fear. Abide in it all the day long. Allow its restraints to be so laid upon

you that your moderation may be known unto all men, and that being preserved by it in a quiet and lowly mind, you may, under its influence and in simple dependence upon Christ, witness for yourselves the evangelical blessing promised by the Lord through his Prophet,—"Unto you that fear my name shall the Sun of righteousness arise with healing in his wings."

The events which have been recently passing in surrounding nations cannot fail to have seriously impressed those who sympathize with the social condition of their fellow men. Truly the vanity of trusting in princes and in armies has been strikingly exhibited; and whilst witnessing the workings of the wrath of man, we have been afresh taught that the Lord doeth according to his will among the inhabitants of the earth, and that none can stay his hand, or say, What doest thou? It is not for us to unfold the designs of the Almighty in permitting the events which have been passing before us, but we think they clearly proclaim that it is righteousness alone, which forms the true basis for the prosperity and stability of nations. We rejoice with trembling in contemplating the condition of comparative order and tranquility which prevails in our own country. We have not been without threatenings and warnings. May they lead us, individually and as a nation, into a close examination of our state, and into a fuller recognition of the Divine laws of justice, mercy and truth, as the governing principles of national as well as individual action. It is our prayer that all the turnings and overturnings of kingdoms may be overruled to the spreading of the Truth, and to the extension of the government of Christ in the hearts of the children of men: and may it please the Lord to continue his protecting care to our beloved Queen, to endue her counsellors with wisdom, and in his unmerited mercy,

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to grant a continuance of peace and internal tranquility to our country.

May we dear friends, be individually preserved from the excitement and strife into which many are hurried by the things which are passing around them! Let us rather be concerned by watchfuluess unto prayer to know what is our own duty, whether civil or religious, and in humility and without self-seeking, to fulfil it aright as to the Lord and not unto men. And whilst taking our part in endeavoring to relieve the wants of the poor, and to promote, in accordance with our christian principles, their religious, moral and social amelioration, may we be kept from an undue meddling with political affairs, lest they draw us aside from our proper sphere of action,

and from that quiet, retired and trustful mind which so becomes the disciples of Him who declared, "My kingdom is not of this world."

Amidst the rumors of wars prevailing around us, we continue to feel the value of the testimony which has been given to us to bear against the use of arms, and against all war, defensive as well as offensive. But in making this declaration, we are not unmindful of the difference between bearing this testimony in a season of peace, and in a time of actual war or civil outbreak.— It is therefore our earnest desire that it may be given to all our dear friends, under whatever circumstance they may be placed, so to feel for themselves individually the ground of the testimony, and to be so strengthened of the Lord for its support, that they may act therein with christian boldness and consistency in all things.— And may they be so preserved in watchfulness against any compromise of principle, trusting not in the arm of flesh, but in the Lord alone; that this precious part of our christian profession may be maintained inviolate; and

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through their faithfulness more widely diffused in the earth.

Our tender sympathy has been excited towards many of our dear friends who have suffered the loss of all, or nearly all that they possessed, by the severe commercial distress through which this country has been passing; and we desire that they may receive a full measure of the help and of the true religious concern of their brethren. In some instances we doubt not those calamities have fallen upon them without any breach of integrity, or possibly any want of commercial prudence, at least in its ordinary sense. But we believe that we might appeal to some of our friends, even of this class, who would have to make the acknowledgment, that if there had been a closer adherence to the convictions and limitations of the Spirit of Truth in reference to their religious and temporal duty, they might have escaped some of the trials which have thus overtaken them. Our main concern, however, at this time, applies to the future course of all who, from whatever cause, have been brought into pecuniary difficulty. For you, dear friends, who are thus circumstanced, and for your families, we feel an earnest desire that you may be preserved from yielding to the peculiar temptations incident to your situation,

that you may be enabled to make a right use of your trials, and that, through the help of the Lord, these trials may work together for your good. We believe that your comfort and peace of mind, your respectability in the eyes of all good men, and your future success in life will be materially promoted by a willingness to come down at once to the true level which your altered circumstances require. Few things are so dangerous in cases like yours as the attempt to maintain in some degree the appearances of your former condition. En-

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deavor to depend to as small an extent as possible upon borrowed capital, and should the Lord crown your honest industry and your prudent and contented economy with that prosperity which is often the blessing of the upright, be persuaded not to regard the fruits of this success as fairly your own until you have paid all your former creditors in full. Nothing less than this is consistent with that uncompromising integrity into which true Christian principles lead.

We have in usual course received accounts of the sufferings of our members in **Great Britain** and **Ireland**, in the maintenance of our testimony against all ecclesiastical claims. The amount thus reported, including the costs and charges of distraint, is upwards of nine thousand one hundred pounds. We would again commend this, our Christian testimony, to the continued faithful support of all our friends, under whatever circumstances they may be placed, whether as owners or as occupiers.

Epistles have been received and read in this Meeting from our dear friends in **Ireland**, and from those of the several Yearly Meetings of Friends in **North America**.

Finally, dear friends, let brotherly love continue. It is the token that we are the children of God, who is emphatically love. It is the evidence that we belong to Christ. The Psalmist compares the unity of brethren to the anointing oil and the fertilizing dew. Where it is wanting there in no true fragrance or fruitfulness in the Church. May the Lord himself cause this fragrance and this fruitfulness to abound yet more and more amongst you to his praise!

At our Yearly Meeting of Friends for **New England**, held on **Rhode-Island**, in the sixth month, 1849. The Committee [h]aving charge of our Boarding School presented the fol-[lo]wing Report, which is satisfactory to us, and the propositi]ons therein contained are approved and confirmed by this [m]eeting, and the Clerk is directed to forward copies thereof [to] our Quarterly and Monthly Meetings.

From the minutes of the Meeting,

"TO THE YEARLY MEETING:

The Committee for the Superintendence of the Yearly [M]eeting Boarding School, have during the past year paid such [at]tention to their appointments, as way has opened for, [an]d according to their ability have endeavored to discharge [th]e duties confided to them by the Yearly Meeting.

Our friends, **Silas** and **Sarah M. Cornell**, have continued in [th]e station of Superintendents, and **Charles Atherton** and **Ed-**[w]ard G. Hoag, were engaged as Teachers in the boys' school [d]uring the year, with the addition of **Richard D. Meader** dur-[in]g the winter term. In the girls' school **Martha M. Haines** [a]nd **Anna B Page** have been engaged as Teachers during the [y]ear, and **Lydia Almy** was employed in addition during the [w]inter term.

Instruction in the languages has been given on five days in [th]e week, in both schools during the year by **Lafayette Burr**, [an]d in writing, during the latter part of the winter term, by [C]harles G. Pinkham.

The average number of scholars has been 117, viz. 63 [m]ales and 54 females.

Meetings for worship have been regularly held in the House, [h]armony has prevailed, and the family generally has been fa-[v]ored with good health. One or two cases of varioloid occur-[r]ed during the fall vacation, on which account the commence-[m]ent of the winter term was delayed for two weeks.

Semi-annual examinations of the schools by the Committee [h]ave been made as heretofore, and the Institution has also [b]een visited by sub-committees appointed monthly, and [t]hese examinations and visits have been generally satisfactory, [s]howing a good degree of diligence on the part of the schol-[a]rs, and care and vigilance on that of the Teachers.

The accounts of the Superintendent and Treasurer of the School fund have been audited.

The expenditures of the School for the past year, ending with the last winter Term have been about 14,253 dollars.

The income has been as follows, viz. Interest from the

School fund which may be stated at \$6,800, and from board and tuition of scholars \$6,400.

Total income \$13,200, leaving a deficiency of income to meet expenditure of about \$1,000.

The available balance in the hands of the Treasurer in the fifth month, the time of settlement, may be stated at \$508 77.

During the fall vacation, a considerable alteration was made in the acommodations for the school in the west wing, by which a much more commodious apartment is provided, and

which is believed to be a great improvement. The expenses of this change and of various other repairs are included in the above expenditures. The deficiency in the income to meet the expenses of the Institution may be principally accounted for from the larger number of scholars who have been at the School the past year. The price of board and tuition for members of our own Yearly Meeting, being only about two-thirds of the actual cost, and the balance being made up from the income of the permanent fund, it will be obvious that when the number of scholars exceeds a certain amount, it cannot be expected that the income of the school will meet its expenses, and the number of scholars for the past year having been larger than usual, there has been as it is stated a deficiency in the income to meet the current expenses.

We would propose, that the terms of Board and Tuition, should be continued as last year, viz. thirty dollars per term for members of our Yearly Meeting; forty-five dollars for those not members, one or both of whose parents are members, and fifty dollars for others who may be admitted, and that five dollars per term in addition continue to be charged for instruction in the languages. We would also propose that each Monthly Meeting have the privilege of sending one scholar, free of expense for one term, the same to be occupied either at the next winter or succeeding summer term, at the discretion of the Monthly Meeting. The several Monthly Meetings to notify the Committee at their meeting in the tenth month of their conclusion, in the case they propose to occupy the privilege in the Summer term.

In pursuance of the authority given to the Committee by the Yearly Meeting; a sale has been effected of the parcel of land lying north of **Olney** street in the city of **Providence**, for the sum of six thousand five hundred dollars, and the purchase money has been received or secured in the hands of the Treasurer of the School fund. And in the circumstances under which this piece of land was acquired, it having been purchased from the remainder of a donation from our late friend **Moses Brown**, intended for the enlargement of the Real Estate of the Institution, the Committee are united in recommending to the Yearly Meeting the permanent funding of the money received from the above sale, and the appropriation

of the income only upon the improvement of the Real Estate of the institution.

In conclusion we would express the desire and hope, that this interesting Institution may continue to claim and receive the fostering care and concern of Friends, and that with the Divine blessing, it may become increasingly useful to the rising generation in our religious society in affording facilities for training them up in a love of the truth, and in an increased concern for the maintenance of those precious testimonies given us to bear.

From The
YEARLY MEETING,
held in
LONDON,

By adjournments, from the 23d of the Fifth Month to the 1st of the Sixth Month, inclusive, 1849;

To the Quarterly and Monthly Meetings of Friends in **Great Britain**, **Ireland**, and Elsewhere.

Dear Friends,

Through the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, we have, in this our annual assembly, been favoured, from time to time, with a sense of his holy presence whilst transacting the weighty affairs in which we have been engaged. In the reverent acknowledgment of this his unmerited mercy, we salute you, our dear absent friends, and bid you also be of good cheer and put your trust in the name of the Lord.

It was the language of the Most High through his prophet of old "They shall not be ashamed that wait for me." It is cause of heartfelt thankfulness that, as a

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ciation of the blessedness of a lowly, reverent waiting upon God, and to a belief in the immediate teaching of his Holy Spirit. This is the ground of our testimony to the nature of spiritual worship, and to the source and authorty of gospel ministry. May we all be true to our profession: may each, in a concern for the good of his own soul and for the welfares of his brethren, seek to draw nigh unto God in spirit; reverently to feel after Him who is not far from every one of us. To those who unite together to worship God after this sort, in humble dependence on the help of his Holy Spirit, He graciously condescends to make Himself known for their refreshment and strength, however small may be their numbers. Were these high privileges adequately appreciated, the attendance of all our religious meetings would be felt by us not only as a duty, but often even as a delight: and whilst highly estimating the blessing of a living gospel ministry, where the Lord may be pleased to confer this gift, we should not be dependant upon it, nor unduly discouraged where it may not be found.

We believe that many seeking minds among the different denominations of Christians, whose eyes have been partially opened to the corruptions in the professing church of Christ, and who have been led to desire their removal, are still but very imperfectly alive to the truth, that human intervention is not essential to the public worship of God. Under the idea that it is in vain to assemble for this purpose without a preacher, the character of Christ as the ever present head and all-sufficient helper of his own church is not fully recognized, the individual part which appertains to each living member is but imperfectly felt, and the blessed Apostolical doctrine of the manifestation of the Spirit given to every man to profit

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withal, and the consequent distribution of gifts to the different members of the body for the edifying of the whole in love, are to a large extent virtually lost sight of or denied. How important, then, is it that the testimony which the Lord has given us to bear in reference to these things, should be consistently maintained in the life and power of the gospel; that others beholding their practical excellence may be thereby brought to the full acknowledgment of the Truth.

It was a remarkable characteristic of the gospel labours of those who were raised up by the power of the Lord and rendered instrumental to the revival of primitive christianity in the gathering of our religious Society, that they sought to bring their hearers off from all dependance upon man. They bore testimony to Christ as their Redeemer and Mediator, as their Prophet, Priest and King. He was their refuge, their hope, and their only dependance; and in his love they sought to bring others to a holy settlement upon Him, the one true foundation, and to leave them there. Building on this foundation, their work stood; and it was a work which the Lord owned in the large diffusion of the Truth in doctrine and practice through their means in the earth. They had no new truths to deliver, but it was their honest concern to bring men to the fulness of the truths declared by our Lord and his apostles, and to the living experience of them. We believe these truths and this experience to be the unchangeable heritage of the Lord's people to the end of time.

It is a blessed thing to have the heart truly converted to God, and thereby to have a part in that covenant of light, life and love which He hath made with his people through Him who died for them. But after the beginning

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of the work of grace has been known, many are the conflicts of the Christian's warfare—a warfare in which "the flesh lusteth against the Spirit, and the Spirit against the flesh." Yet to those who, putting their trust in the Captain of their salvation, give not up the conflict, He imparts a faith and a strength whereby they are led on from victory to victory; and He at times cheers them with the hope of the crown which will never fade away. O! that we had every one of us maintained this warfare, that we had never grown cold in our love to Christ; that the earthly mind and the worldly mind had never found place within us and amongst us. How abundant might then have been the fruit upon our branches to the praise of God's holy name! It may be than there are those who, after having known the Lord and the preciousness of his truth, have been suffering year to pass away after year in which, through unwatchfulness, or the love of other things, they have to a great degree ceased bearing fruit.

Awful is the thought of opportunities of usefulness unimproved, of the seasons in which the great and good Husbandman may have been seeking fruit and finding none; but such is the sense that we have of the tenderness of our Saviour's love, and of his gracious intercession with the Father, that we cannot doubt that even for such there is hope. It is true they cannot recover the strength of their days to devote them to the service of the Lord; but He is able and willing to revive his work in the midst of the years; if they return unto Him, He will return unto them, and not only brighten their evening, but cause them to bring forth fruit in old age.

That which quickens and keeps the soul alive unto God, and by which we are made fruitful to his praise,

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must come from Him. We thankfully acknowledge that from age to age the promise of our Lord to his disciples has been fulfilled in the experience of his people, even that the Father would send them another Comforter, who should abide with them forever. "When He, the Spirit of truth, is come," said Christ, "He will guide you into all truth." The Holy Spirit controls and purifies the affections; those in whom it is suffered to work hate evil; and through its sanctifying power man is fitted, in infinite condescension, to become the temple of the living God.

The church of Christ is spoken of, in Apostolic times, as a spiritual house composed of lively stones, a temple in which the Lord reveals his power and glory. The lively stones are they who are brought nigh unto God by faith in his dear Son, and, through the power of the Holy Spirit, fashioned and made meet to occupy their appointed place in that building of which Christ is the foundation and the chief corner stone. As they abide in Him, what ever be their circumstances, whatever the infirmities of their nature, whether their talents or endowments be small or large, they all have their part in the building; and He who appoints them their place will give them their capacity for usefulness in his church. Earnestly, therefore, do we desire that all our dear friends, and those especially to whom the present may be a day of much discouragement, in the consideration of the smallness of their numbers in their respective neighbourhoods, and of their many outward disadvantages, may, in simple dependance upon the help of their Lord, come forward and take their right place in his house and family.

We have often had to remind our friends of the duties of plainness and moderation in reference to dress. With-

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out any diminution of interest on this point, we feel it right at the present time to advert more particularly to those duties with relation to the furniture of our houses and our general manner of living. We are apprehensive that a degree of display, of luxury and of self-indulgence has crept in amongst us, tending not only to gratify the vain mind, but more or less to benumb the spiritual faculties: and the effect is often not less injurious upon the children of those who, in these particulars, are departing from our testimonies. We fear also that some, who are in moderate or even in limited circumstances, being led away by a desire to imitate those whose means are more ample, have been induced to set out in life on a scale of expenditure unsuited to their income, and have thereby been led into a course which has ended in ruin; and where this may not have been the result, their time, their strength and their hearts have, in consequence of the efforts to meet such expenditure, been absorbed by the pursuits of business to a degree detrimental to their religious growth and their usefulness in the church. We feel at the same time a concern that, whilst restrained from a vain, a self-indulgent, or an imprudent expenditure on themselves and their families, our dear friends may be preserved from parsimony and the snare of accumulating property, to their own and their children's hurt. Rather let them regard the larger means which the self-restraint we have recommended would leave at their disposal, as adding to their stewardship for the alleviation of poverty and wretchedness, and for the good of their neighbour.

Our several Quarterly and other Meetings have in usual course forwarded to us accounts of the sufferings of our members in support of our testimony against ecclesiastical

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demands. The amount thus reported, including the costs and charges of distraint, is upwards of Ten Thousand Pounds. We feel the value of this our ancient testimony to the freeness of gospel ministry and to the supremacy of Christ in his church; and we afresh desire that all our dear friends may be concerned to uphold it in integrity, consistency and faithfulness, yet with all Christian meekness.

Epistles have been received and read from our dear friends in **Ireland**, and those of the several Yearly Meetings in **North America**. These written testimonials of love continue to be very acceptable to us. The correspondence has we believe been maintained with great uniformity from

an early period in the history of our religious Society. We gratefully feel that it has been conducted in the renewings of brotherly sympathy and interest: hence we prize this epistolary intercourse, and desire that as between brethren of the same faith, it may ever be carried on under the influence of the love of Christ.

The subjects of the Slave-trade and of Slavery have, with much religious weight, formed a part of the deliberations of this Meeting, during which the testimony of our Society in regard to them has been afresh set forth. It is our prayer, that it may please the Lord, who alone can do it, effectually to reach the hearts of all involved in these abominations, bringing them into fear before Him, and causing the bonds of iniquity to be broken, and righteousness to flow down as a mighty stream. May it consist with His will to hasten this day!

Agitations, religious as well as political, wars and revolutions, distress of nations and perplexity, mark the period in which we live. Beloved brethren, let not these things move us; let us rather receive them as a renewed call to

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stedfastness in the Lord and faithfulness to our Christian principles. If we are Christ's, our inheritance is in that kingdom which cannot be moved. If the God of Jacob is our refuge, we need to fear. "The Lord sitteth upon the flood; yea, the Lord sitteth King for ever. The Lord will give strength unto his people; the Lord will bless his people with peace."

At our Yearly Meeting of Friends for **New England**, held on **Rhode Island** in the sixth month, 1850, the subjoined Report of the Boarding School Committee was presented and read, and was satisfactory to this Meeting, and a Committee was appointed to consider the subjects specially proposed therein to be determined by this Meeting and report their views thereon, as well as on any matter connected with the interests of the Institution, to a future sitting.

"TO THE YEARLY MEETING OF FRIENDS FOR **NEW ENGLAND**, SIXTH MONTH, 1850.

We, your Committee for the Superintendence of the Boarding School at **Providence**, have given attention thereto,—Meetings of the Committee at large have been held at the School, Quarterly, and of a Sub-Committee for its more immediate supervision have been held there Monthly, in the intervening months, at which reports on the condition of the School have been received from members of the Committee deputed to visit it and examine into its condition in the intervals of this Monthly Meetings.

We believe in this manner a pretty intimate knowledge of the condition of the Institution in its various departments has been kept up by the Committee; and we are encouraged to believe that this condition has been generally much in accordance with the wishes of Friends.

The labors of the Committee have been at times called for and bestowed, to encourage the attention of the Teachers and Scholars to the common and indispensible branches of an English education, such as will fit them to fill the common walks of life, and to discourage a neglect of these for the pursuit of such as do not so immediately concern practical business.

Yet we think it right to furnish in the School the means of instruction in some of the more advanced studies such as Mathematics, Astronomy, the Latin, Greek and French languages, Natural Philosophy, &c. But we believe that in the present state of education among Friends in this Yearly Meeting, the Institution will be most useful in encouraging such a course of study as looks to the fitting of the children of Friends practically to fulfill the duties common to all—while we agree entirely with the recommendation of **George Fox**, that Friends' schools should teach whatever is useful in the creation.

Our friends **Silas Cornell** and **Sarah M. Cornell** have continued to serve the Institution as Superintendents, and **Charles Artherton** and **Richard D. Meader** as Teachers in the Boys' School, with the addition of **Welcome O. Brown** during the winter term. In the Girls' School as Teachers we have had the services of **Martha M. Haines, Anna B. Paige**, and **Lydia Almy** during the year. Instruction in the languages has been given as heretofore, for a part of the year by **Lafayette Burr**, and for the remainder by **George Pierce**.

The average number of Scholars has been one hundred and one, viz. fifty-one males and fifty females.

The family has generally been favored with health, and harmony has prevailed. Meetings for worship have been regularly held as heretofore in the house.

The accounts of the Superintendent and Treasurer of the School Fund have been examined and audited.

The expenditures of the School during the year ending with the last winter Term have been \$13,754 51.

The income from the School Fund has been \$6,595 20—and from board and tuition of Scholars and other sources \$6,912 72. Total income, \$13, 507 92, being less than the expenditures by the sum of \$246 59.

The balance in the hands of the Treasurer at the end of the winter Term may be stated at \$262 18, being \$246 59 less than the balance in hand last year—that being the amount by which the expenditures have exceeded the income.

According to the conclusion of the Yearly Meeting last year, the Committee proceeded to ascertain, as near as might be, the actual expense incurred for the board and tuition of a scholar at the School, and found the same to be \$66 per Term, and that sum, according to the direction of the Yearly Meeting, has been charged the last Term for children members of other Yearly Meetings.

The Committee apprehend that this conclusion of the Yearly Meeting is one which it may be well to review, and they think the present a suitable time for the whole subject of the price of tuition and the application of the funds of the Institution to claim the renewed attention of the Yearly Meeting. They therefore believe it right, instead of proposing the terms for board and tuition the coming year, as has been heretofore usually done, to recommend the whole subject to the deliberate consideration of the Yearly Meeting.

We believe usefulness to the School would arise from the members of the Yearly Meeting's Committee on education

attending each of the semi-annual examinations at the School, and would suggest to the Yearly Meeting that such attendance be recommended.

We desire to impress upon the minds of Friends the importance, in our view, of children remaining through the Term they enter for, and being present at the examination at its close. Much discouragement to the care takers at the School and to the Committee, has resulted from scholars leaving previous to such examinations, and we believe a serious loss has also often resulted to the scholars who have thus left, as well as inconvenience to those who remain.

The subject of the training of the youthful members of our religious Society as it has ever been among the most important and interesting concerns of Friends, so we apprehend it remains to be of deep interest to the well being both of its objects and of the Society at large. There is both truth and instruction in the testimony of Scripture. "Train up a child in the way he should go, and when he is old he will not depart from it." We trust the interest of friends on this subject has not abated, and we feel encouraged to believe that the School has, under the Divine blessing, served to promote the object of a guarded and religious education, and we may

express the desire that with the continued care of Friends, it may still be useful to the same end.

The Committee of Men and Women Friends, appointed to consider of the suggestions contained in the Report of the School Committee and any other subjects connected with the interests of the School, have had the same under consideration, and are united in proposing to the Yearly Meeting—that the price for board and tuition in the School the present year, commencing with the now current term, for members of other Yearly Meetings, be restored to the price formerly charged, viz: fifty dollars per Term.

That the price of Board and Tuition for children, members of our Yearly Meeting, for the ensuing year, be Thirty Dollars per Term—and for children not members, one or both of whose parents are members, be Forty-five Dollars per Term, and that the same price be charged for any others who may be admitted. Five dollars per term additional charge, being made in all cases for instruction in the languages.

That the amount to be appropriated the coming year, for free board and tuition, be restricted to the amount of the income of the charitable fund. Monthly Meetings to send forward to the School Committee, at their meetings in the 9th and 3d months, the names and ages of such children, within their limits, as they may think suitable to receive the benefit of the fund, and any other information regarding them which may aid the School Committee—and the children to be received are to be selected by that Committee. The conditions of the bequest of the principal part of the charitable fund being, in the words of the donor, "For the Schooling of such members of the Society as are actually poor, supported or not as such by the respective Monthly Meetings. Females to have equal advantages of the whole of the legacy as males."

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EPISTLE.

DEAR FRIENDS.

In offering you this our renewed salutation, we do it not as a mere customary act, but in a measure of the love of God in Christ Jesus; that love which flows from Him, the exhaustless fountain of all our mercies, and which we reverently believe has again enabled us enter into a united travail of spirit for the prosperity of the cause of Truth. In the same love we now address you, and invite you to thank God and take courage.

Since we last met, an awful visitation has been permitted to fall upon this and other lands. Multitudes were called from time to eternity at an unexpected moment. We desire reverently and with gratitude to God to acknowledge that, in his mercy, the pestilence was stayed. May the solemn warning not have passed unheeded by any one of us!

Our hearts turn, in the feeling of Christian sympathy and warm remembrance, to some of our dear friends in the evening of life, who have long manifested their attachment to the cause of Christ, and whose exercise of mind for the spiritual welfare of the Church is, we believe, unabated. We desire that they may be encouraged to maintain this exercise; in the humble trust that He who has been their morning light will, amid the infirmities of declining years, be their evening song, and, as they continue faithful unto death, grant them an inheritance with the saints in light.

We feel that the mercy of the Lord is still extended to us as a Church; that He is willing to do us good, and to help us to act for the honour of His name. He strengthened our predecessors to bear an open testimony to pure, spiritual religion, and against those corruptions which had so long overspread the Church, and so greatly dimmed the bright shining of the truth as it is in Jesus. Looking unto Him as their sole and rightful Lord, they sought to live under the government of his Spirit, to renounce the world, and in life and conversation, to confess him in all things before men. Is it so with us of the present day? Under this consideration, and in the feeling of our many shortcomings, we are brought low.

The requirements of the Gospel are unchanged. It is a blessed proof of its excellency and divine origin, that it has been found adapted to the circumstances and wants of man, in every age, in every station, and at all periods of life. Striking at the root of the evil propensities of the corrupt heart, it condemns sin in the flesh; it brings man out of that state of alienation from God in which he is by nature; and enables him to resist, and finally to overcome, all his easily besetting sins. Being a message of glad tidings of great joy to the penitent sinner,—and "all have sinned, and come short of the glory of God," —it brings him, as it is received in faith, to the Lord Jesus Christ, who died for the sins of the whole world, and it gives him a blessed hope of salvation through Him, and of life, peace, and joy with Him for evermore.

Dear Friends, —What do we individually know of having passed from death unto life? May this solemn inquiry be brought home to every one of us. In the great mercy of God, the Holy Spirit visits all, to bring about a thorough change; to begin, to carry forward, and to complete the purification of the soul, the entire subjection of the natural will, and the establishment of all in a conformity to the divine will.—This work of the spirit is an inward work, often gradual in its progress, but powerful in its operations. It is to be waited for, to be sought in prayer and in humble prostration of the soul before the Most High. In

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the progress of this work, humiliation, conflicts and self-denial are to be endured; but in the Lord's time the blessed fruits of love, peace, and joy are brought forth. To this work of the Spirit in the heart, our early Friends were brought in a remarkable manner: their souls panted for the bread of life, and for that water which Christ declared to be "a well of water springing up into everlasting life." He gave them to partake of this bread, and of this water; and, blessed be his name, He hath bestowed this same spiritual food and refreshment upon his faithful followers who have waited for it, down to the present hour.

You know, beloved brethren and sisters, that in order to partake of

this spiritual sustenance, and as a public testimony of our dependence upon God, and of our allegiance unto Him, we assemble together for the worship of our Creator. We entreat you to avail yourselves of all the privileges thus placed within your reach. Some of our meetings held for this purpose are, we know, very small; we sympathize with those who attend them, and desire their encouragement and help, and that it may be given them to experience the fulfilment of the blessed assurance of our Lord, often referred to amongst us and ever retaining its undiminished force and authority, "where two or three are gathered together in my name, there am I in the midst of them." We again remind our members of the great advantage of attending those meetings which are held in the middle of the week. In a feeling of love we call upon our friends to withdraw for a time from the cares of the world, unitedly to feel after God, looking unto Him for the renewal of their spiritual strength. We invite them also, on these occasions, to set at liberty, as far as practicable, all their fellow professors who are their assistants in trade, or who are in other ways dependent upon them, that they may share with them in the religious benefits which may be thus enjoyed. And we afresh desire that all our members may be alive to the importance of the right occupation of the first day of the week, not only in the attendance of meetings, but in the profitable use of other parts of the day for their spiritual improvement, being at the same time

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careful that they do not by undue exertion, even for laudable objects, disqualify themselves for the performance of public worship. It is a real privilege to live as we do in a country in which there is so little to interfere with the performance of this duty. We further encourage our dear friends to wait before the Lord in private, when in consequence of travelling in foreign lands or from any other circumstance they may be unable to attend a meeting. The truly awakened mind will not confine itself to the occasions to which we have alluded, but amid the daily avocations of life will often be lifted up unto God; and will seek for opportunities to draw nigh unto Him, and to pray for wisdom and strength to live acceptably before Him.

We take comfort in the belief that the practice of the family daily reading of the Holy Scriptures is very generally prevalent among our members: we desire that it may be observed by all Friends. And we would at this time further recommend the diligent private reading of them. They are a revelation of the will of God to the children of men, —the records of the way of life and salvation most surely to be believed by us: they contain divine mysteries which are to be accepted in the simplicity of faith. As the enlightening influence of the Holy Spirit is sought for, they are opened and applied to our various wants, contributing to our growth in grace. They are thus felt to be most precious and invaluable, being made instrumental in bringing us to a

holy settlement on Him who is the "way, and the truth, and the life."

The precepts of our Lord and his Apostles apply to us, whatever may be our pursuits or avocations. In the counting-house, in the shop, or in the market; in the crowded city, or in the retired hamlet, in the most solitary allotment, as well as in the performance of our duties one to another, and in our endeavors to serve our fellow-men, we are all exposed to temptation to violate the pure and holy law of God. The adversary of man's happiness adapts his temptations to all the varied circumstances of life. The Lord is our only refuge and sure defence against these assaults; the help of his Spirit is graciously afforded in all

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our exigencies. But if we expect to be thus preserved and led along in safety through the journey of life, we must ask in prayer for the help of the Spirit, and be concerned to follow its guidance.

The believers in Christ are spoken of as a royal priesthood. To the great privilege of offering "spiritual sacrifices, acceptable to God by Jesus Christ," we are all invited under the new covenant. As we come to enjoy this privilege, we are brought not to depend one upon another, or upon stated performances in the public worship of God, and are confirmed in the truth, that typical rites and ceremonies are no part of the spiritual dispensation under which we live. In the love of the Gospel, we would express our warm desire that not only all the members of our own Society, but that all who profess the name of Christ may be brought to feel and to acknowledge, and to be established in the truth, that "the kingdom of God is not meat and drink; but righteousness, and peace, and joy in the Holy Ghost."

This view of the spirituality and freedom of the Gospel leads to the non-observance of days enjoined by the civil or ecclesiastical authority as those of humiliation or thanksgiving. Whilst endeavoring faithfully to obey all laws which do not infringe upon the divine law, we continue to believe that to impose such observance, in the name of any ecclesiastical rulers whatever, is an interference with the prerogative of Christ, who alone is the head over his own Church. It is the great duty of Christians so to live, that when public calamities visit a nation, their sense of the chastening which is laid upon them may be manifested by humiliation of soul, under a feeling of that constant dependance upon God in which our spiritual strength so greatly consists. In connexion with the support of the principles already stated, we have in usual course received the reports of the sufferings of our members on account of ecclesiastical claims, to the amount of upwards of eight thousand eight hundred pounds. We press upon all our dear friends a faithful refusal, in the spirit of meekness, of all those demands which are made for the support of a system from which we are well known to dissent.

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Our love to our absent brethren has afresh extended to those on the American Continent; from all the Yearly Meetings of which, as well as from our dear friends in **Ireland**, we have at this time received acceptable Epistles in usual course. In this love we desire that the power of the Lord may be sought and felt among them, in all their assemblies for his service, and in all their efforts for the spreading of his truth upon earth.

And now, dear Friends, in conclusion, let us encourage one another to walk worthy of the vocation wherewith we are called as a Church and as individuals. This vocation is nothing less than to uphold the standard of Gospel Truth in its primitive purity and power. The recent agitations of the public mind on many important subjects of doctrine and of discipline, and especially on baptism and ministry, may, through the overruling providence of God, be preparing the people more at large to perceive the errors which crept into the Church in the apostacy, and to apprehend the nature of the one true and saving baptism, the real character of spiritual worship, and the only right call and qualification of Gospel ministers. On each of these great subjects a testimony has, we reverently believe, been given us of the Lord to bear,—a testimony strictly accordant in all points with Holy Scripture, and resting thereon; but which we renewedly feel can only be borne in integrity and Christian consistency, through the help of the Holy Ghost dwelling in us. It is only as we are living under its government that we can be enabled to adorn the doctrine of God our Saviour in all things and by the purity and self denial of our lives and the weight of our spirits, practically hold out to others the inviting language—Come and "have fellowship with us: and truly our fellowship is with the Father, and with his Son Jesus Christ." May this be more and more known amongst us, to the increase of our joy in the Lord, to the extension of the Redeemer's Kingdom upon earth, and to the glory of his holy name! The subjoined annual Report of the Boarding School Committee was presented and read, and a committee was appointed to take the same into consideration, and report their judgment on the propositions contained therein to a future sitting.

TO THE YEARLY MEETING OF FRIENDS FOR NEW-ENGLAND, SIXTH MONTH, 1851.

The Committee for the Superintendence of the Boarding School at **Providence**, Report—that they have given attention to their appointment, and from time to time met as a Committee at large and by Sub-Committees for the supervision of the School and its various concerns.

The Committee have, they trust, felt the weight and importance of their interesting charge, and have endeavored according to their ability to promote in the Institution a religious, guarded education, consistent with our religious profession.

The School during the year has been under the charge of our friends Silas and Sarah M. Cornell as Superintendents.—
Charles Atherton and Moses C. Stevens have served as Teachers through the year, in the male department, with the addition of John Henry Crossman during the Winter Term. In the female department we have had the services of Anna B. Page and Anna Inman during the Summer Term, and of the latter with Deborah Holway and Mary W. Hawkes during the Winter Term. Elizabeth Prosser has also been engaged as Teacher of drawing, and has had the care of some of the younger scholars in both Schools during the year. Instruction in the

Latin and Greek Languages has been given by **George Peirce** for both terms, and in the French Language during the Winter Term by **Louise Parrot**, a native French Teacher.

The average number of scholars has been ninety-two, viz., forty-eight males and forty-four females.

During the Summer Term, the health of the family was generally good. In the Winter Term the measles prevailed to a great extent among the scholars, there having been forty-six cases among one hundred and twenty-one scholars in the School at the time.

It was cause of thankfulness that all these cases terminated in recovery to health, except one. Mary Smith, daughter of Moses Smith, of Dartmouth, an interesting young woman, of amiable disposition and very exemplary deportment, was removed by death. She took the disease while laboring under some other bodily infirmities, which probably tended to increase its severity. Her strength rapidly declined, and after being confined to her room four days only, her gentle spirit passed away on the evening of the 21st of First month, being a few days over 18 years of age.

The accounts of the Superintendent and Treasurer of the School Fund have been audited.

The expenditures of the School for the year ending with the Winter Term have been \$13,413 12.

The Income received from the School Fund has been \$7,495—and from board, tuition, and other source, \$6,137 77. Total income, including balance of last year, \$13,632 77; — leaving unexpended in the Superintendent's hands \$219 65, an amount about equal to that in hand in Spring of 1850. Beside the above expenditures, the sum of \$529 50 has been expended on improvements on the farm and premises, and in the purchase of scientific Books, from funds specially appropriated to those objects.

We would propose that the terms for board and tuition the coming year, should remain as last year, viz.: for members of our Yearly Meeting Thirty Dollars per Term—for members of other Yearly Meetings Fifty Dollars per Term—and for children not members, one or both of whose parents are members of our Yearly Meeting, Forty-five Dollars per Term, and that the same price be charged for any others who may be admitted. Five Dollars per Term additional charge being made in all cases for instruction in the Languages.

That the amount to be appropriated the coming year, for free board and tuition, be restricted to the amount of the income of the charitable fund. Monthly Meetings to send forward to the School Committee, at their Meetings in the Ninth and Third months, the names and ages of such children, within their limits, as they may think suitable to receive the benefit of the Fund, and any information regarding them which may aid the School Committee; and the children to be received, to be selected by that Committee. The condition of the bequest of the principal part of the charitable fund being, in the words

of the donor, "For the schooling of such members of the Society as are actually poor, supported or not as such by the respective Monthly Meetings. Females to have equal advantages of the whole of the legacy as males."

The subject of the continuance of holding meetings for worship for the scholars and family in the house, has been several times, during the year, solidly considered by the Committee; and it has resulted in the conclusion to bring the subject before the Yearly Meeting for their consideration, with a view, if the Yearly Meeting should unite therein, of the Committee for the superintendence of the School the coming year, being authorized, as way may open for it, to direct the discontinuance of such meetings in the house, and the attendance of the scholars and family of the Meetings for worship in **Providence**.

In conclusion, we would express a feeling of thankfulness for the sense we have of the continued usefulness of this School, and for the religious concern cherished, we trust, by Friends, that under the blessing of Divine Providence, the School may be increasingly useful in fostering in the minds of

The Committee of men and women Friends appointed to consider the subject of authorizing the Committee for the Superintendence of the Boarding School, to discontinue as way may open for it, the meetings for worship for the scholars and family in the house, and to provide for them to attend meetings for worship in **Providence**—Report: That they have taken the subject into solid consideration, and they would recommend that the proposition in the Report of the Boarding School Committee in relation thereto, be adopted by the Yearly Meet-

—which is satisfactory, and the Report of the School Committee is adopted, and the Clerk directed to forward copies of it to our subordinate Meetings.

The proposition of a regulation of Discipline in regard to the manner of making additions to our Meetings of Ministers and Elders, being now again brought before us, claimed our solid consideration, and was united with by this Meeting, and with the concurrence of the Women's Meeting, is adopted and established as Discipline—and the Clerk is directed to have it printed in suitable form and furnished to subordinate meetings, to be by them inserted in the Book of Discipline, and to go into effect when the meetings shall have received a copy of the same. It is as follows: —

"Instead of the paragraph commencing on the 78th page with the words, "As these are officers, &c." and ending on the 79th page with the words "case of Elders," in the edition of the printed discipline of 1849. —the following paragraphs are to be substituted, viz.:

In the appointment of Elders, the following order is to be observed—Whenever it shall appear on solid consideration to any Monthly Meeting that an appointment of an Elder or Elders in such Monthly Meeting is right and proper, the Monthly Meeting are to appoint a Committee to consider of a suitable friend or friends rightly qualified for that station. The Monthly meeting both of men and women uniting therein. When said Committee are united in judgment, that any friend is rightly qualified for such station, they shall in writing request the Quarterly Meeting to appoint a Committee to join with them in considering the subject, without communicating the name or names of the friends proposed. The Quarterly Meeting shall thereupon comply with such request, the men and women's meeting uniting therein; and if the Committee of the Quarterly Meeting so appointed shall advise thereto, the Committee of the Monthly Meeting shall propose such friend or friends to their Monthly Meeting; and after the Monthly Meeting have approved such, adjudging them duly anointed and qualified for that service, as they are officers of the church at large, let them acquaint the Quarterly Meeting therewith, who after waiting for their concurring unity, and finding nothing to hinder, are to minute the same, and the friend or friends so appointed, may then sit in any of our Meetings of Ministers and Elders. Information of such appointments is to be given by the Quarterly to the select Quarterly Meetings, and by each of the Quarterly Meetings to the Yearly Meeting, and the names of the friends appointed are to be entered on the minutes of the select Quarterly Meetings, and on the Yearly Meeting's records.

And where any friend appears in public ministry, whose conversation shall be clean and blameless, and the Elders of the

Monthly Meeting he or she belongs to, (or in case the Quarterly Meeting shall have joined the select members of two or more Monthly Meetings into one Meeting, then the Elders of such Meeting,) are convinced that the Lord hath called them to that weighty work, after duly waiting for due proof thereof, they shall in writing request the Quarterly Meeting to appoint a Committee to unite with them in considering the same, who shall thereupon comply with such request, the men and women's Meeting uniting therein, and if said Committee of the Quarterly Meeting shall advise thereto, the Elders of the Monthly Meeting or of the Select Meeting to which the select members of such Monthly Meeting may belong, shall signify their unity with the gift of such friends in the ministry to the Monthly Meeting, who after weightily feeling after the mind of truth therein, and being united in approving him or her as a Minister in the Church, the same be entered and sent forward, in like manner as in the case of Elders."
